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RESOLVED, that congregations are encouraged to work together in their geographical regions and circuits to identify locations for 74 new faith communities in their context, understanding that many of these new ministries will reflect the great cultural 77 diversity and need within our district; and be it further

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81 RESOLVED, that the members 82 congregations are encouraged to commit themselves to the mission-sending 83 efforts of their circuits and congregations 84 85 by volunteering their time, activity, prayers, and resources in support of this 86 87 effort; and be it further

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WHEREAS, God's Word call us to pray for additional workers in the harvest, "When he (Jesus) saw the crowds, he had 10 compassion for them, because they were 11 harassed and helpless, like sheep without 12 a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers 14 are few; therefore pray earnestly to the 15 Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest;" (Matthew 9:36-37, ESV); and

17 18 WHEREAS, pastors of the Lutheran 19 Church-Missouri Synod are retiring in numbers than ever 21 (estimated 1/3 of our Congregations will be 22 without a Pastor by 2035) and the number 23 of men entering our seminaries is less than 24 what is needed to replace these faithful servants and expand further mission and 26 ministry; and

28 WHEREAS, the congregations of the 29 Pacific Southwest District – LCMS give 30 thanks to God and celebrate the various 31 alternate routes to ordination and pastoral 32 ministry available in the LCMS, such as Specific Ministry Pastors (SMP), there is a 34 growing need for general ordination pastors who are able to receive divine calls 36 from congregations without restriction, provide supervision for other rostered 38 church workers, supervise vicars, hold elected or appointed office on the district or national Synod level such as a Circuit 41 Visitor, and vote as delegates at the 42 Synodical conventions of the church; and

44 WHEREAS, there are pathways by which pastors, from church bodies outside the 46 Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, who 47 meet specific criteria may secure admission to the ministerium of LCMS as 48 general ordination pastors through 50 Colloguy. This admission may be provided through a "colloquy" (discussion, interview) with the Colloquy Committee for the 52 53 Pastoral Ministry; and

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The Policy 55 WHEREAS. Manual 56 Admission to the Pastoral Ministry of The 57 Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod by Colloquy: Bylaws and Policies states that applicants for Colloguy must fit into one of 60 two categories (the Colloguy Committee 61 for the Pastoral Ministry is responsible for the final determination of the category in 62 each individual situation):

- 1. Active Pastors from Other Christian Church Bodies: Men who, at the time of application are in good standing and in active service as pastors another Christian Church body/denomination may apply for colloquy.
- 1. Men who have prepared for pastoral ministry but, at the time of application, are not in active service as pastors: Such applicants must be graduates of a program of that leads study ordination. from an accredited institution, with no fewer than 60 semester hours (90 quarter hours) of required academic credit. **Applicants** with prior pastoral service must provide the date (month and year) and the reason (e.g. retirement. resignation, their dismissal) active service ended. Such an applicant also must have been а communicant member in good standing in a congregation of The Lutheran Church—Missouri

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71 RESOLVED, that the Pacific Southwest 72 District memorialize the 2023 LCMS 73 Convention to direct Concordia 74 Seminary St. Louis to remove the 75 current limitations for the Cross-cultural 76 Ministry Center (number of students, 77 geographical locations of students, and 78 criteria for culture-crossing ministries) to enable more men to prepare for the pastoral ministry.

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# 9.0 TASK FORCES

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9.1 Task forces may be developed for specific purposes at the discretion of the district president, regional mission facilitators, Board of Directors, or standing committees. Task forces function under the direction of the person or group that appointed them. The task forces may be regional or for the district as a whole.

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Task forces should be chartered with a specific purpose and task and include aspecific ending time.

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# 10.0 PARI IAMENTARY AUTHORITY

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10.1 The Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod, the Bylaws of the District, any special rules of order the District may adopt, and the rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised shall govern the district as parliamentary authorities wherever they are applicable and in decreasing order of precedence as listed.

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# 11.0 SPECIAL RULE OF ORDER

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11.1 The following special rule of order shall apply to the proceedings in the district:

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11.1.1 If a substitute motion is made and seconded the presenter shall be offered two minutes to provide the rationale for presenting the motion. The convention shall then first decide by majority vote without debate whether ornot to consider the substitute motion. If the decision is in the affirmative and the substitute motion is subsequently adopted, the original motion fails; if the substitute motion does not receive favorable action either to consider or to adopt, the original motion is again before the convention.

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# 12.0 AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

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12.1 These Bylaws may be amended as follows:



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- 12.1.1 At a meeting of the District Convention by a majority vote provided that the amendment has been submitted in the Convention Workbook or in the Unprinted Reports and Overtures for that meeting and the delegates have a minimum of one night to review it. Prior review and approval by the Commission on Constitutional Matters will be required. When prior approval is not possible, actions taken will not become effective until and unless such approval has been obtained.
- 12.1.2 At a meeting of the Board of Directors by a majority vote upon the express direction of the District Convention to amend the Bylaws to implement a specific resolution adopted by the convention. Prior review and approval bythe Commission on Constitutional Matters will be required. When prior approval is not possible, actions taken will not become effective until and unless such approval has been obtained.
- 12.1.3 When necessitated by amendments to the Synod Constitution or Bylaws or otherwise expressly directed by a resolution of the Synod in convention, amendments may be made by a two-third's majority of the District Board of Directors. Such amendments shall be drafted by the District Secretary in partnership with the District Committee on Constitutions and shall be reviewed in advance by the LCMS Commission on Constitutional Matters.
